PRESENTATION: PROCLAMATION DESIGNATING JANUARY 11TH AS "HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS DAY"

The following Proclamation was presented to Lesley Frost of the New Jersey Coalition Against Human Trafficking.

RESOLUTION: NO. 193-2012

Member Ferramosca offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

**A PROCLAMATION OF THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF
HANOVER DESIGNATING JANUARY 11, 2013 AS
HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS DAY IN HANOVER TOWNSHIP**

WHEREAS, human trafficking is a borderless crime against individuals that violates the most basic human rights and deprives victims of every shred of personal freedom; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking occurs when a person is recruited, harbored, obtained, or exported through force, fraud, or coercion for the purposes of sexual or labor exploitation, involuntary servitude, and other types of mental and physical abuse; and

WHEREAS, human traffickers target impoverished and marginalized children, women and men, isolating them from society and supportive networks and exploiting them for personal and monetary gain; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking is the fastest growing criminal enterprise in the world today, and is tied with arms smuggling as the second largest international criminal industry, falling only behind the illicit drug trade; and

WHEREAS, the United Nations' International Labor Organization has estimated that at least 12.3 million adults and children worldwide are currently in forced labor, bonded labor, or forced prostitution; and it is estimated that more people are now harmed by Human Trafficking worldwide than have been at any other point in human history. Approximately 80% of the victims are women and girls, and 50% are younger than age 18; and

WHEREAS, many victims trafficked into the U.S. do not speak or understand English and are unable to communicate to seek rescue. Under U.S. law, any person under 18 involved in the commercial sex industry is considered a human trafficking victim; and victims include U.S. citizens and documented immigrants; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey is a prime location for human trafficking because it is a major national and international transportation corridor and a culturally diverse state; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking is modern-day slavery, a practice that is in direct opposition to the fundamental principles of liberty and human rights upon which our nation was founded; and

WHEREAS, on February 1, 1865, President Abraham Lincoln signed the 13th Amendment to the United States Constitution. Once ratified, it officially outlawed slavery and involuntary servitude except as punishment for a crime; and

WHEREAS, although the federal government and the State of New Jersey have enacted laws to prosecute human traffickers and protect the victims of human trafficking, traffickers use techniques to keep their victims enslaved that severely limit

self-reporting and that require broad public awareness of human trafficking issues for enforcement and prevention to occur; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey State Constitution declares that all persons are by nature free and independent and have certain natural and unalienable rights; and

WHEREAS, the people of New Jersey, regardless of political persuasion, creed, race, or national origin, stand together with the global community to protect the fundamental freedoms and rights of all persons, to fight the proliferation of human trafficking in all of its forms, and to assist survivors of modern day slavery; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Hanover is committed to protecting human rights and individual freedom by eliminating human trafficking.

WHEREAS, the Township of Hanover is resolved to support the goals and ideals of observing a National Day of Human Trafficking Awareness on January 11 of each year and to support all efforts by individuals, businesses, organizations, and governing bodies to raise awareness of and opposition to Human Trafficking.

WHEREAS, the Township commends the work of the NJ Coalition Against Human Trafficking for its statewide efforts to end human trafficking through education, advocacy, and assistance to survivors and to increase coordination and visibility of New Jersey's commitment to end human trafficking.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Hanover in the County of Morris and State of New Jersey as follows:

1. The governing body hereby proclaims January 11, 2013 and each year thereafter as **Human Trafficking Awareness Day** in the Township of Hanover to raise awareness about the signs and consequences of human trafficking, to promote opposition to human trafficking in all of its forms, and to encourage support for the survivors of human trafficking throughout the State of New Jersey and across the world to put an end to this criminal activity and restore freedom and dignity to its survivors.
2. That this proclamation be submitted to the New Jersey Coalition Against Human Trafficking for reference and information purposes.

OPEN TO THE PUBLIC:

Mayor Francioli opened the meeting to the public.

Diana Plaza of 2 Briarwood Court submitted a petition to the governing body signed by residents who live in close proximity to the property in question opposing the rezoning of property located at 62-66 North Jefferson Road which would allow the development of townhouse units. She thanked the Mayor for voting to reject a revised concept plan submitted by the developer at a recent Planning Board meeting.

Mayor Francioli accepted the petition and stated that the Township Committee is not legally compelled to abide by the petition but it will be taken under advisement.

The Mayor then shared the following on the current status of the property rezoning. He stated that two weeks ago the Planning board did hear the developer's recommendation and turned him away with instructions to come back to the December Board meeting at which time the Board would look at a revised concept plan. This, he noted, does not mean it will be a concept for condos or housing. He suggested that residents watch the Township's website, look for the application to appear again and attend the meetings.

Joseph Shatynski of 40 Windemere Court stated that he was out of town when the developer's plan was reviewed by the Planning Board. He said he asked others what occurred and the way it was described was that the Board took a vote which ignored the input of the residents and allowed only two people from the audience to participate. He said that he was concerned, had no confidence in the Board and felt that it was shocking to hear that the Board would not consider single family homes. He also said that he felt the proposed rezoning is not appropriate nor is it the responsibility of the residents to make a project financially viable for the developer.

Director of Planning Ferramosca thanked the speakers for expressing their views. He also suggested that residents attend the December 11th Board meeting and said that he would recommend to the Planning Board Chair that the meeting be opened to the public for comment.

Father Roman of St. John's Ukrainian Catholic Church then addressed the Township Committee on this subject. He asked whether the individuals who attended the Planning Board meeting and who provided a show of hands response to a question directed toward the audience were residents. He pointed out that a majority of those who signed the petition submitted this evening live in close proximity to the property and should bear greater impact. Father Roman also clarified a statement made at the meeting, which was that the Church was not opposed to three story townhouses

adjacent to the Church. He said that the Church IS opposed to multi residences on the property as three story townhouses would out shadow the Church. And, the last question concerned whether the members of the Planning Board were advised that the governing body was opposed.

Member Ferramosca stated that he advised the Board how the Township Committee felt.

Mayor Francioi again assured everyone that the board members were properly instructed regarding the density and said that he hopes the developer comes back with a residential plan.

Scott Devine of Windemere asked what can be done to clean up the property of accumulated debris. The resident was advised that the Property Maintenance Officer has issued warnings and was advised by the present owner that the debris would be removed by November 2nd.

No further comments forthcoming, Member Ferramosca moved the public hearing be declared closed. The motion was seconded by Member Schleifer and was unanimously passed.

Member Ferramosca offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF HANOVER AUTHORIZING A FOUR (4) YEAR EXTENSION TO THE AGREEMENT FOR CURBSIDE COLLECTION OF RECYCLABLE MATERIALS FOR THE PERIOD BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 2013 AND ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2016

WHEREAS, the provisions of the "New Jersey Statewide Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act," (N.J.S.A. 13:1E-99.11 et al.) (the "Act"), require every municipality in this State to provide for the source separation and recycling of marketable materials generated from residential premises within its jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, the Morris County Municipal Utilities Authority (MCMUA) desires to assist municipalities in meeting their recycling goals by providing curbside pick-up and a convenient outlet for disposal of recyclables; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Municipal and County Utilities Authority Law N.J.S.A. 40:14B-1 et seq., the MCMUA may enter into contracts with municipalities for the provision of recycling services; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act, N.J.S.A. 40A:65-1, (L.2007, c.63, s.2.), a Municipal Corporation and a County Utility Authority in the State of New Jersey are considered "Local Units". Local Units are encouraged and authorized to enter into agreements which promote the sharing and/or consolidation of services; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Hanover and the MCMUA entered into an agreement to provide for the curbside collection of recyclable materials which began July 25, 2011; and

WHEREAS, the contract continues until December 31, 2012 and includes a provision to extend the contract for a four (4) year period commencing on January 1, 2013 and ending on December 31, 2016; and

WHEREAS, in order to exercise the extension, the Municipality shall provide the MCMUA sixty (60) days written notice prior to December 31, 2012 of its intent to extend for the prices proposed by the MCMUA; and

WHEREAS, the prices proposed by the MCMUA for the next four (4) years are as follows:

- for 2013, a zero (0) percent increase from the 2012 price of \$206,100, equivalent to \$206,100;
- for 2014, a two (2) percent increase from the 2013 price of \$206,100, equivalent to \$210,222;
- for 2015, a two (2) percent increase from the 2014 price of \$210,222, equivalent to \$214,426; and

for 2016, a two (2) percent increase from the 2015 price of \$214,426, equivalent to \$218,715.

WHEREAS, uniform shared services agreements are exempt from the bidding requirements of the Local Public Contracts Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee supports and endorses the efforts of the MCMUA in working with municipalities under a shared services arrangement to provide for the curbside collection and disposal of recyclables and therefore, agrees to extend the current curbside collection agreement for another four (4) year period.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Hanover in the County of Morris and State of New Jersey as follows:

1. The Business Administrator/Township Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to send written notice to the MCMUA to exercise the four (4) year contract extension for the period beginning January 1, 2013 and ending on December 31, 2016 at the prices set forth above.
2. A certified copy of this resolution shall be transmitted to the MCMUA, the Township's Recycling Coordinator, the Superintendent of the Public Works, Buildings and Grounds and Park Maintenance Department and the Chief Municipal Finance Officer for reference and information purposes.

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE AWARDING A CONTRACT TO MSKY CONSTRUCTION CORPORATION, THE LOWEST RESPONSIVE AND RESPONSIBLE BIDDER FOR BID NO. 14 – THE CONSTRUCTION OF SIDEWALKS, DRIVEWAY APRONS AND CURBS AND TO JO-MED CONTRACTING CORPORATION, THE LOWEST RESPONSIVE AND RESPONSIBLE BIDDER FOR BID NO. 15 - THE CONSTRUCTION OF STORM SEWER INLETS AND MANHOLES FOR THE CONTRACT PERIOD BEGINNING NOVEMBER 1, 2012 THROUGH

OCTOBER 31, 2013

WHEREAS, the Township of Hanover, acting in conformity with N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq. publicly advertised for bids on September 24, 2012 for the construction and installation of sidewalks, driveway aprons and curbs and storm sewer inlets and manholes, on an as needed basis; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to public advertisement, the Township's Bid Reception Committee received and opened a total of eleven (11) sealed competitive bids out of seventeen (17) prospective bidders on October 16, 2012 for the following categories of services:

1. Bid No. 14 – Sidewalks, Driveway Aprons & Curbs - Four (4) Bidders;
and

3. Bid No. 15 - Storm Sewer Inlets and Manholes - Seven (7) Bidders.

WHEREAS, the Township Engineer, acting within his authority and in conformity with N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et seq. has carefully examined all of the bid documents received on October 16, 2012 and has set forth his recommendations concerning the award of contracts to the lowest responsive and responsible bidders for each of the categories set forth above; and

WHEREAS, the Township Engineer's Letter Recommendation dated October 23, 2012 is attached hereto and made a part of this resolution as if set forth in full; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with N.J.A.C. 5:34-5.1 et seq., and the Local Budget Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:4-1 et seq., the Township's Chief Municipal Finance Officer has only certified as to the availability of funds appropriated through the 2012 Current Fund Budget - Other Expense Line Items for the current budget year ending on December 31, 2012.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Hanover in the County of Morris and State of New Jersey as follows:

1. In accordance with the recommendations of the Township Engineer, in his Letter Recommendation dated October 23, 2012, which is incorporated herein and made a part of this resolution as if set forth in full, the governing body authorizes the following:

A.Bid No. 14: To MSKY Construction Corporation, located at 830 Route 15 South in Lake Hopatcong, New Jersey 07849 for the construction and installation of sidewalks, driveway aprons and curbs. **MSKY Construction Corporation**, the lowest responsive and responsible bidder submitted all of the documentation pursuant to the Township's bid documentation submission checklist.

B. Bid No. 15: To **Jo-Med Contracting Corporation** located at 815 Garden Street in Elizabeth, New Jersey 07202 for construction and installation of storm sewer inlets and manholes. **Jo-Med Contracting Corporation**, the lowest responsive and responsible bidder submitted all of the documentation pursuant to the Township's bid documentation submission checklist.

The bids of **MSKY Construction Corporation** and **Jo-Med Contracting Corporation** were in total compliance with the Township's Bid Specifications and Supplementary Specifications for Bid No. 14 and Bid 15 and did not include any exceptions, deviations or deficiencies and therefore both contractors are deemed the lowest responsive and responsible bidders.

1. The Mayor and Township Clerk are hereby authorized to execute contracts with **MSKY Construction Corporation** and **Jo-Med Contracting Corporation** all for a one (1) year period commencing November 1, 2012 through October 31, 2013.

2. Subject to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:11-15, the governing body, upon a finding and determination by the Township Engineer that **MSKY Construction Corporation** and **Jo-Med Contracting Corporation** have performed in an effective and efficient manner during the twelve (12) month contract period, the governing body may, by separate resolutions, extend the contracts of either or both contractors for one (1) additional year provided that the terms and conditions of the 2012-2013 contracts remain substantially the same. Any price changes included as part of the one (1) year extensions shall be based on the price of the original contracts adjusted to an amount not to exceed the Index Rate for the twelve (12) months preceding the most recent quarterly calculation available at the time either or both contracts are renewed.

3. Pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:34-5.1 et seq. and the Local Budget Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:4-1 et seq., the Township's Chief Municipal Finance Officer has only certified as to the availability of funds appropriated through the 2012 Current Fund Budget - Other Expense Line Items for the current budget year ending on December 31, 2012. The purchase and/or procurement of goods, services, materials and equipment for the second half of the contract period shall be subject to the availability of sufficient funds being appropriated in the adopted 2013 Current Fund Budget.

4. That certified copies of this resolution shall be transmitted to the vendors listed herein, Township's Chief Municipal Finance Officer, the Township Engineer, and the Superintendent of Public Works, Buildings and Grounds and Park Maintenance for reference and information purposes.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Member Ferramosca informed those present that due to the efforts of the Township's Economic Development Advisory Committee the U.S. Postal Service parcel on Jefferson Road has been purchased by a private sector business which will have a positive impact on ratables.

Member Brueno advised that the Halloween Parade will be held at Malapardis Park this Saturday from 2 to 4 PM. He noted that the parade was postponed last year due to a storm and once again this year we are awaiting the arrival of another major storm.

Member Schleifer stated that due to the current leaf pickup season some overtime will be necessary to remove the leaves before further major storms occur to avoid potential flooding.

Mayor Francioli stated that the Police and Fire Departments are preparing for the arrival of the storm and Emergency Management is keeping him informed. He announced that the Community Center will be open and available for resident use. And, Member Ferramosca suggested that residents sign up to receive reports via the Nixle program.
